Brenda Jones Harden, Ph.D., University of Maryland and ZERO TO THREE

Brenda Jones Harden, PhD, is a Professor in the Department of Human Development and Quantitative Methodology, University of Maryland College Park. Dr. Jones Harden is a Chair, Committee of the Board of ZERO TO THREE.

For more than 35 years, Dr. Jones Harden has focused on the developmental and mental health needs of young children at environmental risk, specifically children who have been maltreated, are in the foster care system, or have been exposed to multiple family risks such as maternal depression, parent substance use, and poverty. She is particularly interested in using this research to inform practice, with respect to preventive interventions to promote positive outcomes for children reared in high-risk circumstances, such as home visitation and Early Head Start.

Dr. Jones Harden is currently working on a major evaluation of an Early Head Start-child care partnership initiative and the implementation and evaluation of a group-based intervention to promote language development in infants and toddlers from low-income backgrounds. In addition, she is completing three studies: (1) an implementation and impact evaluation of an intervention to reduce the toxic stress experienced by children enrolled in Early Head Start, (2) an impact evaluation of a rural home visiting program focused on pre-literacy, and (3) and implementation evaluation of a local Educare program.



Anne Gearity, Ph.D., University of Minnesota and Washburn Center

Anne has a mental health practice in Minneapolis. She also teaches at the University of Minnesota (Social work, child psychiatry, IECMH/infant and early childhood mental health certificate program) and consults throughout the community about children. Her contribution to early childhood is *Developmental Repair*, an intervention approach for very at risk children using principles of infant and early development. Washburn Center for Children piloted this model and it is now being replicated in many settings throughout the state.



Judy Ohm, Wilder Child Development Center

Judy is currently the Manager of the Child Development Pre-School and Parent Education Center at the Wilder Foundation. Her vision and focus continues to be on parents and children, strengthening their relationships to support a lifetime of learning. Years of experience in working with parents of children who have received Wilder services through residential treatment, foster parents who care for children with Reactive Attach-ment Disorder. In the last 14 years, she has managed the pre-school the implementation and expansion of the Incredible Years curricula in pre-school classrooms and parenting sessions.

Judy is trained in all three components of the curriculum; Classroom, Parent Education, and Small Therapy Group for children. This curriculum is an interactive tool where teachers and facilitators create a collaborative process that is instructive and supportive in building skills and relationships. Judy has a Bachelor's of Science in Social Work, and now focused on a Master's in Organizational Leadership.



Deidre Quinlan, Circle of Security International

A certified Circle of Security® supervisor, Deidre provides international training, clinical supervision, and site based consultation with childcare centers, practitioners, clinicians, teachers, registered facilitators, and others interested in learning together at a deeper level the Circle of Security®. In addition, she provides COS-P fidelity coaching and videotape review to researchers and facilitators around the world. As a staff member at Circle of Security International, Deidre works as a Project

Developer to contribute to and support the ongoing development of Circle of Security® projects.

Deidre is particularly interested in resilience and the ability of the developing person to persevere and overcome childhood risks and adversities. For more than 20 years, Deidre has focused her clinical work on our most vulnerable population, adolescent parents and their children, using a relationship focus on developmental repair to inform her work. As the director of an integrated model of care for parenting students and their children, she supervised a licensed childcare center, school based health care and mental health clinic, and teen parent education classes.

Deidre completed her graduate studies at the University of Minnesota as well as her post-graduate training in the Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health Certificate Program. Over the years, she has worked in a variety of settings including residential treatment, community group homes, schools, day treatment, child care centers, after school programs, and in out-patient clinics. Deidre is endorsed by the Minnesota Association of Infant and Early Childhood Mental Health as a Level III Infant Mental Health Specialist.

Deidre lives in Minnesota on a hobby farm on the North Shore of Lake Superior with her husband and three children, her father-inlaw, many horses, some chickens, a few cats, a rabbit, and sometimes a dog.
